SUCCC: Obey foreign workers hiring policy

SANDAKAN: The Sabah United Chinese Chamber of Commerce (SUCCC) is asking palm oil industry players in Sandakan to obey the existing government's policy on hiring of foreign workers.

Its president, Tan Sri Andrew Liew, said that the affected palm oil industry players in Sandakan could voice out their opinions and problems through the Sandakan Chinese Chamber of Commerce (SCCC), given the SCCC is also willing to comply with the existing rules.

"Sandakan district is dominated by palm oil cultivation. Given the demand for labour is high and at the same time insufficient, it is only natural to rely on foreign labour.

"However, SCCC should pay attention to the government's policy involving registration of foreign workers. With SCCC being cooperative to the government, our Chinese merchants can use SCCC as a platform to voice out our problems and views so that we could get pragmatic and effective solutions from the government in this industry.

"We cooperate and coordinate with each other, and work as a team," he said.

Liew who is also a member of the Sabah Economic Advisory Council said this in his opening remarks during the 72nd SCCC Inauguration Ceremony in Tiong Hua Hall here last Saturday.

He said as one of the earliest Chinese business organisations established in Sabah, SCCC has been serving as a bridge between the Chinese community and the government.

"SCCC serves its role to deliver the government's policies to the Chinese businessmen here, while reporting its needs and demands to the attention of the government so that the government's policies can be strengthened and improved; it is a win-win situation for both parties," he said. Liew also said that SCCC has not only been leading the Chinese businessmen and Chinese communities in Sandakan, but has been actively participated in social development and community building activities organised by the government.

"SCCC has also contributed to the education sector of the district through its contribution to the Sekolah Menengah Kebangsaan Tiong Hua Sandakan," he added.

Liew also said that he is happy that the Sabah Chief Minister Datuk Seri Hajiji Noor is determined to develop Sandakan's economy and hopes that the government will help Sandakan to restore its former glory economically.

The SCCC Inaugural Ceremony saw Chia Hock Ak sworn in as Chairman of SCCC, Chong Chang Hing as Deputy Chairman, and Lim Vui Khing, Khoo Huai Liang and Liaw Hen Kong as Vice Chairman.

i·PARK Light Industry launched

More importantly, he said the project is built on higher ground and will not be flooded.

"Apart from its location advantage, i-PARK is designed to cater to the needs of light industrial small and medium enterprises (SMEs) operating in the digital era, including as warehouse for businesses and courier companies, bakery, central kitchen, frozen food processing factory, automobile spare parts distribution or repair," he said to the media after the groundbreaking ceremony of the project here on Monday.

He said the project capitalizes on the current trend by combining retail and light industrial activities under one roof that is suitable for various business sectors, such as food and beverage (F&B), homeware, gymnasium, pet store, lighting store, bridal shop and hardware.

Fong said i-PARK is divided into two rows, each row having just four light industrial units.

"i-PARK is one of the few low-density light industrial areas in Penampang."

The built-up area of the units range from 2,029 square feet (sq ft) to 2,923 sq ft, while the land size range from 2,266 sq ft to 5,841 sq ft.

He said i-PARK features a

contemporary design with flexible space concept by offering different built-up and land sizes so that clients could customize the space based on their needs.

"Coupled with breadband and

"Coupled with broadband and smart devices, operators will be equipped with a competitive edge that enables their business to stand out in the market."

Furthermore, Fong said i PARK offers 20-foot high ceiling on the

ground floor, which is suitable for retail, showroom, manufacturing, refrigeration and warehousing purposes, while leaving ample space for extension on the sides and back.

The 27 feet wide front porch provides sufficient parking space for two vehicles or a heavy-duty

Meanwhile, the 12-foot high space on the upper floor can be subdivided into smaller rooms, such as a reception, office, meeting room, accounting department, research and development department.

Fong said i-PARK is priced from RM1.6 million onwards, while the booking fee is RM10,000.

"To date, we have sold 30 per cent of the units," adding that the project is expected to be completed in the third quarter of 2023. Aside from early bird offer and giving away smart devices, the developer is offering flexi down payment package, subject to terms and conditions. Fees for sales and purchase agreement and loan agreement are also waived.

Form strong local alliance — LDP president

KOTA KINABALU: Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) president Datuk Chin Su Phin has reiterated his call for Sababbased political parties to form a strong local alliance.

He said local party leaders should put aside their differences and unite to form a formidable political front, which when coupled with Sarawak's political alliance, would rise to become a powerful force that could change the political landscape of the country.

"Unity among local parties will enable us to pursue better interests for the wellbeing of East Malaysians, especially Sabahans."

He said the recent Sarawak state election has sent a strong message that majority of Sarawakians chose local parties. "People in Sarawak have firmly backed local parties in the state election. Of the 82 state seats, local parties have won 80 seats, including 76 by Gabungan Parti Sarawak (GPS) and four by Parti Sarawak Bersatu (PSB), while Pakatan

Harapan-Democratic Action Party (PH-DAP) only won two. "I believe Sabahans will emulate their Sarawakian counterparts in supporting local parties in the next general election."

Chin said East Malaysians have become weary of the political culture of peninsular parties, in which racial extremism, infighting and political squabbles were a common occurrence.

He said people in Sabah were also upset about various federal issues, among others, unfair allocation of budget, delay in the Pan Borneo Highway project, restriction on the sale of beer in business premises, racial bias in primary history textbooks, which would affect the cohesiveness of the diverse society in Malaysia.

Chin said Sabahans and Sarawakians have co-existed peacefully for decades, irrespective of race and creed.

"We will not tolerate any attempt by racial or religious extremists to destroy racial harmony," he said when chairing the first meeting of the Supreme

Council 2021-2024 here on

On the other hand, he said more than 90 per cent of the Supreme Council positions were filled by young leaders, in line with LDP's goals to rejuvenate and reform the party. He said the move would strengthen the organization and attract more young bloods to join the party.
